Cover Story

In September of 1787, the Founding Fathers signed the most influential document in American history: the United States Constitution. Every year, the Sons, Daughters and Children of the American Revolution commemorate that historic day by hosting the Constitution Day Debutante Ball on September 17 at the King of Prussia Doubltree. This year, as in previous years, the Pennsylvania Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution hosted a formal celebration that included "The Presentation of Debutantes" where Children of the American Revolution participate as either debutantes or escorts. A variety of social media explains that a debutante ball is an event where a young woman, or in some cultures, a young man, is formally introduced into society. In many societies, such a ball is associated with wealthy and socially-influential families. The United States, England, Ireland, and Australia all have variations on this event.

In Colonial America, the history of the debutante ball centered around ceremonies that involved the debutante wearing certain clothing, such as a white ball gown. Traditionally, debutantes were introduced by former debutantes, often their mothers if they had had a coming out, or else a mother-in-law introducing her son's new wife.

In the United States, a debutante ball is also sometimes called a cotillion. American balls may be quite elite and formal, with a receiving line of young women all in white gowns who are introduced, in turn, on stage by their fathers. The debutante also often has a date at the ball, and sometimes more than one male date. The young men may also be dressed all in white or in a military uniform. This year's event ended with a dance where young and old alike enjoyed the festivities.



An example is a panel titled "Independence Declared" which includes a transcript of the "Bedford Resolves" which the residents adopted on 09 May 1775 which, incidentally, was eleven days prior to the Mecklenburg Declaration, which is so often touted as being the (first set of resolves) supporting

uring their chapter meeting, the SAR chapter members were presented with a charter to replace one that long since had disappeared. State officials attended the meeting to celebrate this rededication of the chapter's charter. Attending the re-dedication ceremony from left to right include the following state officials and Erie members: Chapter Secretary, David Karrfalt; PASSAR President, Don Mengle: Book Night Chairman and former US senator, William F. "The foundation of our Empire was not laid in the gloomy age of Ignorance and Superstition, but at an Epoch when the rights of mankind were better understood and more clearly defined, than at any former period, the researches of the human mind, after social happiness, have been carried to a great extent, the Treasures of knowledge, acquired by the labours of Philosophers, Sages and Legislatures, through a long succession of years, are laid open for our use, and their collected wisdom may be happily applied in the Establishment of our forms of Government; the free cultivation of Letters, the unbounded extension of Commerce, the progressive refinement of Manners, the growing liberality of sentiment, and above all, the pure and benign light of Revelation, have had a meliorating influence on mankind and increased the blessings of Society. At this auspicious period, the United States came into existence as a Nation, and if their Citizens should not be completely free and happy, the fault will be entirely their own."

Would You Sign the Constitution?

"When was the last time you successfully changed anyone's mind about anything? Or even got a small group of people to agree on something? Now, try to imagine fifty-five men getting together in Philadelphia in 1787, trying to agree on a better way to unify the states into a nation" (National Constitution Center, p.9) something that had proven impossible under the Articles of

Confederation. These are some provocative questions posed by the National Constitution Center in its lesson plan for educators entitled, "To Sign or Not to Sign." Some favored a strong central government, Federalists; and some favored strong states' rights, Antifederalists. Somehow, after months of quarreling and compromise, those

men managed to hammer out the enduring framework for America's Constitution. Every year on Constitution Day, we celebrate those men and the Constitution they wrote.

September 17, 1787 was the final day of the Constitutional Convention, when 39 of the men still present in Philadelphia chose to sign the document. In 1917, the Sons of the American Revolution formed a committee to promote Constitution Day. It took some time. First, there was Citizenship Day, then Constitution Week. Constitution Day was established as a civil holiday by Act of Congress in 2004. It mandates that all schools receiving federal funds, and all federal agencies, provide educational programming on the history of the American Constitution each September 17th, or when it falls on a weekend, on the nearest weekday.

Constitution Day 2016 fell on a Saturday, so the Fort Ligonier Chapter of the DAR and the General Arthur St. Clair Chapter of the SAR took advantage of the opportunity to present a citizenship education program "Would You Sign the Constitution?" provided by the National Constitution Center in Philadelphia, PA to more than 1,000 visitors to the Ligonier Country Market held in Westmoreland County PA.

This DAR/SAR program was developed using the lesson plan "To Sign, or Not to Sign" from the Constitution Day Kit of the National Constitution Center. The kit is available for \$35 on-line (http://constitutioncenter.org/). In addition to the lesson plan, it includes a life-size parchment reproduction of the original US Constitution. US Representative Tim Murphy and PA Representative Mike Reese donated pocket-size copies of the US Constitution for distribution. Following the program, the educational materials were delivered to teachers and students in the local school district.

Chapters' volunteers, dressed in Colonial costumes, helped visitors understand the issues and the people who shaped the United States Constitution. They displayed the "original Constitution" along with quill pens, inkwells and a scroll to

record the signatures of modern day supporters of that document.

After viewing the display and learning some of the political opinions of Convention delegates who signed or refused to sign the Constitution in 1797, visitors were invited to respond to the now more provocative statement, "Would You Sign the

Constitution?" They were presented the opportunity to sign the Constitution now in 2016, if they chose, or to discuss what it meant not to sign. Either way, they were in good company as the exhibits showed, for example:

John Jay, a citizen of New York and a Federalist signed saying, "This plan is the result of accommodation. The men who formed this plan are Americans, who had long deserved and enjoyed our confidence, and who are as much interested in having a good government as any of us are or can be. They do not hold it up as the best of all possible ones, but only as the best which they could unite in and agree to. If such men, appointed and meeting under such auspicious

circumstances, and so sincerely disposed to conciliation, could go no farther in their endeavors to please every state and everybody, what reason have we, at present, to expect any system that would give more general satisfaction? No one man or thing under the sun ever yet pleased everybody" (National Constitution Center, p.9).

Elbridge Gerry, a delegate from Massachusetts and an Anti-Federalist did not sign and said, "As the Convention was called for 'the sole and express purpose of revising the Articles of Confederation, and reporting to Congress, and the several legislatures, such alterations and provisions as shall render that document adequate to the exigencies of government and the preservation of the Union,' I did not conceive that these powers extend to the formation of the plan proposed" (Library of Congress).

From the beginning, there were questions about the very things Americans had fought for in the Revolution. Wouldn't a stronger central government mean weaker states' rights? Compromises, like slavery, would take years, even bloodshed, to resolve. Fundamental rights of individual citizens were overlooked. That required 10 amendments, called the Bill of Rights. Sovereignty of Federal law over state law, the power to tax, make foreign treaties and declare war almost squelched the deal. Ultimately, the delegates agreed to a brilliant compromise. A balance between federal power and states' rights. And the rest, as they say, is history that we celebrate each Constitution Day.
