Women and the American Revolution, 1750-1783

Though women in the English colonies were <u>legally barred</u> from nearly all forms of public and political life, they found numerous ways to engage in the political discourse that heated up in the years before the American Revolution.

Whether it was by producing <u>homemade goods</u> to avoid paying import taxes, <u>writing scathing political satire</u>, or publicly declaring a <u>boycott of British goods</u>, women were more than capable of bringing their considerable social and economic influence to bear in support of the Patriot cause. Their efforts were <u>not always welcome</u>, but they were effective.

The outbreak of the war in 1775 at the Battles of Lexington and Concord cleaved a fissure right through the heart of colonial society. Thousands of women suddenly found themselves living in a war zone, endured years of hardship, and many lost everything as the American and British Armies battled across the continent. Some women rose to the position of head of the household when their husbands departed for the war, while others became camp followers of the Continental Army and actively contributed to the success of the American enterprise. Loyalist women exploited their reputations as the "weaker sex" to run successful spy operations in New York, while in Philadelphia, Peggy Shippen Arnold covered her husband Benedict's plotting with mundane shopping tasks. Without the efforts of women on both sides of the revolutionary divide, the war would have progressed very differently.

While there, I visited the SAR Headquarters and their impressive Genealogical Research Library. On these same grounds, the SAR Education Center and Museum is planned for construction by 2026, in time to celebrate the 250th anniversary of American Independence. 





<u>Public Service and Heroism Awards</u>: (page 80-81) John F. Mitchell is the new chairman. PASSAR presented 34 awards last year in 4 of the 5 categories (no awards presented for heroism). He will appreciate your input for nominations in all 5 categories this coming year.

Americanism/Education Committee: George Clarke, Jr. presented a power point presentation (copies of slides are attached as an addendum to the minutes) to promote a new method to introduce the subject of the American Revolution and the way of life of the Revolutionary Period to children in the classroom. This method is promoted by the national society and other state societies, including Georgia and includes utilizing a period chest with historical items used as a show and tell. The cost of the chest and supplies would be reimbursed to PASSAR up to \$500.00. The source of this funding is from a family donation for classroom history. This chest would be used in classrooms across the state. If the program is successful, an additional chest could be purchased.

During the discussion of this proposed program a number of motions were made and withdrawn in order to clarify the subject for a vote. After some additional clarification of the bylaws by Chancellor William McKim, a final motion was made by Robert Grumbling, (2nd by FP J. Thomas Showler) for approval to recommend the appointment of an ad hoc education committee by President Lick and \$500 from the PASSAR Treasurer to be spent for the supplies. A call on the question was made and the motion was approved by a majority of ayes.

President Lick established a new ad hoc education committee for his term of office and appointed George Clarke, Jr. as chairman. Forrest C. Myers volunteered to serve on the committee.

The Americanism Committee will remain as a standing committee.

2024 Congress Planning Committee: George Clarke, Jr. presented a power point presentation (copies of slides are attached as an addendum to the minutes) to inform the attendees of the progress of the 2024 Congress. The Lancaster Marriott Hotel was chosen as the site of the Congress. The Congress will start on Thursday with long tours and host reception. Friday would be the day for the memorial service, Rumbaugh Oration and the Ladies Tea. Saturday will be Session 1 of the Congress as well as other meetings/events. Sunday will be Session 2 and elections. Monday would be the third session with the short tours and, later that evening, a black-tie banquet. Tuesday will offer a day trip to Philadelphia, possibly by train.

It is estimated that attendance will be 400 to 450, with an average age of 65 to 80 years old. With that in mind, FP Joseph B. McMullen and the Continental Congress Chapter will coordinate tours and the host reception. The nightly room charge will be \$149 plus tax.

The goal is to recognize 2 to 4 Revolutionary Patriot Graves at the Congress.


<u>National Congress Awards:</u> (List on page 83) President Lick presented the remaining awards from the National Congress in July.

Unfinished Business:

President Lick President Lick reminded the attendees of the unrestricted gift of \$44,500.00 from the Ramsey Estate. At the Summer BOM, he had proposed that \$40,000.00 be used for the 2024 National Congress and that \$2,500.00 be donated to the fund for a new flagpole at the Washington Crossing Historical Park that is supported by Chapter President Bill Hampton and Washington Crossing Chapter. The total cost of the project is \$16,000 and qualifies as an America 250 Event.

Since the last BOM, President Lick has had discussions with George Clarke concerning the budget for the 2024 National Congress. They recommend that we table the appropriation of the \$40,000.00 for now as budgetary determinations are still in process.

President Lick continues to recommend the approval of \$2,500.00 to be donated to the fund for a new flagpole at the Washington Crossing Historical Park



A motion was made by FP 2nd VP Eric Troutman, (2nd by 1st VP Michael Seibert) for approval – Unanimous.

New Business:

President Lick reported on our participation in the America 250 PA partnership of non-profit organizations working together for this important event (pages 90-91). Philadelphia Continental Chapter participated in a color guard event with the Masonic Organization. Fred Fonseca reported on the Philadelphia Continental Chapter's participation with the Masonic Organization in a tree planting dedication program. One tree will be planted and dedicated in each county of Pennsylvania. These joint activities are good for increasing awareness of PASSAR.

President Lick on the America 250 event to commemorate "the Ten Crucial Days" at Washington Crossing Historic Park on December 26, 2021 at 11:00 am (page 92). He invites all color guard members to the Wreath laying ceremony and luncheon.

President Lick will be emailing information regarding a Wreath laying ceremony in New Jersey on January 2nd 2022.

Treasurer Don Mengle reported on our third entry to secure a sales tax exemption. It is a process that will take some additional time.

Forrest C. Myers inquired about life time membership fee requirements. It appears that PASSAR has a chart for calculating the fee. Don Mengle will look into this issue. Generally, individual chapters determine their fees for lifetime membership.

Endorsement of NSSAR Contested Elections. Treasurer, Registrar, Genealogist, Chaplain:

President Lick previously emailed the contested election categories as well as the candidate's biographies. This material is available on a table in the conference to review.

A motion was made by FP Ernest Sutton, (2nd by William Haynes) for PASSAR to endorse the uncontested national candidates – Unanimous.

Time was given for individual endorsements of the candidates in the contested elections.

The results of the election for the contested offices: Treasurer General, Darryl S. Addington; Genealogist General, Robert B. Fish, Jr.; Historian General, C. Louis Raborg, Jr.; Chaplain General, Kenneth D. Roberts.

President Lick thanked the Continental Congress Chapter for their support for the meeting. He closed the meeting and led the Recessional. The colors were retired and Robert Grumbling, Jr. gave the Benediction.

Arthur St. Clair Chapter Honors Inaugural Class of Female Eagles

According to the Scouting "Be the Change" event, nearly 1,000 young women are part of the inaugural class of female Eagle Scouts during Scout Week 2021. In total, more than 140,000 young women have joined the Cub Scouts and Scouts BSA programs since they began allowing female scouts in 2018 and 2019, respectively. Even more young women have joined Explorer Scouting since 1974. Only 6% of those joining Scouting today become Eagles. Becoming an Eagle requires demonstrated leadership ability, developing, and leading a service project and subject expertise in 21 merit badges.

In the inaugural class, 3 of the female Eagles are from the Pennsylvania. Lead by President Thomas Carnahan, the Gen Arthur St. Clair Chapter supports the Westmoreland Fayette County Scout Council. Two of these three Eagles are from Troop 1274 in Ligonier, PA. (The 1 indicates it's the female troop of 274). Compatriot Francis D. Stillman approved and mentored these sisters through their service project and served on their Eagle Board of Review. Representing the St. Clair Chapter, both VPG Ernest Sutton and District Deputy Francis Stillman were honored to speak at the Eagle Count of Honor of these dynamic sister Eagles: Elizabeth and Hannah Yothers. Both start college in Pennsylvania this fall.

At the 131st SAR Congress in Renton Washington, compatriot Ernest L. Sutton, MD was elected SAR Surgeon General for 2021-23. Ernie and his grandmother reached their genealogy together while in he was High School at the Newberry Library in Chicago. During this time, as a scout he became an Eagle and as an Air Explorer Scout he received his Silver Award (Formerly called the Ace Award).

During college at The Citadel, Charleston, SC, he joined the SAR. Throughout his subsequent career in the US Army, Dept of Veterans Affairs and the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center, he has been with many different chapters and state societies before retiring in Export, PA and joining the General Arthur St. Clair Chapter, Pennsylvania Society.

After college, he was commissioned in the US Army and attended the University of Illinois Medical College where he received his MD and MS in Pharmacology. He initially served with the 1st Ranger- Airborne Battalion at nearby Savannah GA. Afterward he was a flight surgeon, before completing his residencies in Internal Medicine and Gastroenterology. During his military services, he had six overseas tours and earned his Masters of Public Health degree in Bethesda, MD. After he attended the US Army War College, Carlisle, PA, he served as a Hospital Commander and Command Surgeon of Southern Command during the drug wars. After retiring he served as a hospital chief of staff at a Veterans Affairs Medical Center and as an Assistant Professor of Medicine at the University of Pittsburgh.

After joined PASSAR he served as State President from 2013-14 and is the current state Historian and Eagle Scout Chair. During his time as Flag chairman, PASSAR qualified for the prestigious Admiral William R. Furlong Memorial Flag Streamer Award for 5 straight years. During the last 6 years in the Mid-Atlantic States District, he served as their secretary and then Vice President General from 2019-2021. With the national society, he currently serves on the Medical Advisory, Flag and Strategic Planning Committees, and is a member of the Museum Board.





Bond Award Returns Home by Ernest Sutton, PASSAR Historian

The prestigious VPG Thomas J. Bond, Jr, Memorial Membership Award of the Mid-Atlantic District (MAD) returns back to the Pennsylvania Society. When the award was initially presented 18 years ago in 1994, the Pennsylvania Society was the first recipient in MAD to have the highest percent increase in membership at the beginning of the new year as determined by the national registrar. MAD includes Delaware, District of Columbia, Maryland, Pennsylvania and Virginia. During 2020, the Pennsylvania Society had a 5.4% increase in membership. Overall, the membership in MAD increased by 2.74% or 133 compatriots. The total increase in the 7 societies of the Atlantic Middle States Association (AMSA) which additionally includes the Empire State and New Jersey increased 3.33% or 223 compatriots.

During the Conference Past VPG Ernest Sutton received the District Meritorious Service Medal and the Gold AMSA Service Medal for his 6 years of leadership as VPG and secretary. His wife Janet received the Lydia Darragh Award for her continued long support of MAD.

The 2022 AMSA Conference will by hosted by the New Jersey Society at Princeton, NJ on August 5-6, 2022 which is the first weekend. This is a change from the usual second weekend.

Attendees enjoyed a presentation on "The Whisky Rebellion" by PSSDAR Honorary State Regent Deborah Davis. NSSAR Surgeon General and Past PASSAR President Ernest Sutton installed Chapter President Jon P. Coulter and other elected officers of the Pittsburgh Chapter. Compatriot William Boswell sponsored five new members into the chapter. They are the sons of Compatriot Scott Brady, who range in age from nine to seventeen years old. PASSAR President Andrew Lick proudly installed Aidan, Colin, Liam, Andrew and Ryan Brady into the Pittsburgh Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution.

from Fordham University, and the VADM George C. Dyer Writing Excellence Award from the Military Officers of World Wars.

Todd is a nationally recognized World War II historian and the Executive Director of the Veterans Breakfast Club, a Pittsburgh based organization that for the past 13 years has collected, live recorded, and shared stories of veterans, both combat and otherwise, from World War II to the post-911 conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan. Originally serving audiences with face-to-face meetings in southwest, Pennsylvania, the Veterans Breakfast Club has transformed itself over the last several years into a nationally focused organization that broadcasts its programs and interviews throughout the United States, Canada and other parts of the world. This oral history project uses modern technology, linking military and civilian communities. It has created a forum where veterans, from across many generations, can share their stories with the rest of the world. This helps our veterans to heal from the wounds of war and preserves their experiences for posterity. The Pennsylvania Society, Sons of the American Revolution, salutes Dr. Todd DePastino for his outstanding commitment to the history of our nation and to the welfare of our brave soldiers who have fought for our founding principles.
