Who were the thinkers behind the American Revolution which would give birth to the greatest Republic the world had ever seen? Actually, men like Washington, Jefferson, or even Samuel Adams, were not the "root" thinkers of that Revolution. You may be surprised, but the truth is: It was the <u>Pastors</u> who inspired the thinking that brought about the American Revolution. They taught it in the churches! The Provincial Congress of Massachusetts stated in 1774:

"...we cannot but acknowledge the goodness of Heaven in constantly supplying us with preachers of the Gospel whose concern has been the temporal and spiritual happiness of this people...and do therefore recommend...that they assist us in avoiding that dreadful slavery with which we are now threatened..."

(*Christian History of the American Revolution*, V. Hall (F.A.C.E. pub.), p.402)

The inspiration for the Battle of Lexington and Concord, which began the Revolutionary War, was none other than Jonas Clark, Pastor of the Church in Lexington for twenty years before the Revolution. It was he who authored almost every state paper written to record the town's position on liberty. Without him, there may have been no "shot heard round the world!"

America's founders were taught the Biblical principles of resistance to dictatorial government by their Pastors. You hear these principles echoing all through our Founders' writings. They wrote much in their journals and documents just so following generations <u>could</u> know the foundational ideas on which they birthed and built this nation into the greatest in world history. They didn't claim that they came up with these ideas. They constantly acknowledged the Bible to be the source of this wisdom.

Each of you can help with committee work and planning now, maybe giving \$1, 2 3, 5 dollars a month or so to the Congress planning fund. Then as we move on, we need more ideas and helping hands to carry out other parts of the planning process.

When we get to 2023, we can start to gather volunteers to help with designing and setting up displays, instruction and direction signs, even manning the Congress "Hospitality Room" for attendees to visit for a breather, coffee, rolls, nuts, candy, etc. during the congress.

Patriot Founder of Connellsville Honored by Eagle Scout and General Arthur St. Clair Chapter

On a hill overlooking Connellsville and the Youghiogheny River where General Braddock's Army crossed in 1755 is the family cemetery of Patriot Zachariah Connell the founder of the Borough of Connellsville. The cemetery was in disrepair and difficult to climb up to its hilltop location. That's until Scout Zachary Coughenour of Troop 101 as his Eagle Scout project for the community decided to restore the cemetery, construct a stairway, erect a flagpole and using the remnants of Connell's 1906 centennial headstone create a new one. Spearheading the General Arthur St. Clair support of the project was Anthony Keefer. At the dedication on 12 Sep 2020, the chapter provided its full color guard,



guest speaker Ernest Sutton and chapter president Thomas Carnahan presentation of SAR/BSA Partnership in Good Citizenship to Zack and his scoutmaster.

Patriot Connell was one of the earliest settlers in the area known as the District of West Augusta in 1770. He served as a justice of the peace till the revolution when commissioned as a captain with the Rangers of the Frontier from 1778-1783. Afterward he secured a charter on 21 March 1793 for land that he surveyed known as "Mud Island", a jumping off point for travelers to build rafts to go down the river. Later it became the Borough of Connellsville in 1806.

Continental Congress Annual Meeting



Anybody Here Seen My Old Friend John?

The Tale of a Grave Lost and Found, a New Friend Found and Lost, and My Journey to the SAR

hat began as an overcast, dreary day had matured into a gorgeous summer afternoon. More than 100 spectators, from State Representatives to distant "cousins," had joined the local Boston media to witness a rare event – the re-dedication of a Revolutionary War soldier's "lost" grave site. Not since the 1930s had anyone truly known who was buried in the brownstone in-ground crypt marked by a broken horizontal slab, sadly worn away by two centuries of unforgiving New England weather. Now, with a new granite headstone in place and a healthy crowd of his own descendants present, Private

Jonathan Waitt (1763-1821) would once again be recognized for his service to the fledgling nation he once helped to defend and create.

I stood there proudly – albeit, with great humility – among the dignitaries and reenactors as my dear friend Libby Potter welcomed the crowd to our little gathering. Libby was an active member of the local DAR chapter in Danvers, and it was because of our mutual love of history that this "simple ceremony" had become the fullblown "event" we unfolding before us. It seemed to us as though our motto - "the worst they can say is 'no" had resulted in a community-

wide celebration of family, friendship, and love of country.

Libby and I had "met" only a few months earlier, over an endless thread of emails and long weekly phone calls. They centered around my desire to re-dedicate the grave site of Jonathan Waitt, who served from Massachusetts in the Continental Army during the Revolutionary War – and who also was one of my fifth great grandfathers. I had spent much of the previous three years meticulously researching Jonathan's life and his Revolutionary War service, so this event would not only be the crowning achievement of those efforts and a beautiful way to honor Jonathan's service, but also an opportunity to encourage others to do the same. In recent years, Libby herself had tried, in vain, to draw public attention to the many neglected colonial-era cemeteries in Danvers. The town had even voted down funds to restore similar burial grounds, choosing the needs of the living over those of the long dead. It quickly became evident to us that this event needed to be *extra* special.


Although I've lived in Pennsylvania since 1979, I was born and reared in Massachusetts. So, one holiday weekend, I found myself in Danvers conducting a fruitless search for Jonathan's headstone, a photo of which I had planned to add to my ever-growing

collection of ancestor grave sites. This disappointment led me to later contact the Danvers Town Archives, headed up by noted historian Richard Trask, who left no stone unturned and (to his credit) answered all of my questions regarding Jonathan's final resting place. Ultimately, three years' worth of searching paid off, in the form of a simple cemetery map made by the Works Progress Administration (WPA), the ambitious employment and infrastructure program created by President Roosevelt in 1935, during the bleakest years of the Great Depression. The map turned out to be our "smoking gun," clearly listing Jonathan's grave site


> as a rectangle-within-a-rectangle - a slightly raised crypt with a flat stone on top. The only one like it in the cemetery was in the exact same spot on the map. There, a broken horizontal slab lay behind an equally broken and tattered SAR medallion. Long forgotten and ignored, Jonathan's grave site was right under our nose the whole time. Not only had we positively identified it for the first time in almost a century, but I suddenly found myself with another incredible opportunity: I could apply for a brand new, government-issued granite headstone to permanently mark his grave and service to his country.

the headstone seemed easy enough. The Veterans' Administration required a name, birthplace and date, death place and date, etc., along with official documentation to back it all up. While that may be easy for a more recent veteran's grave, I spent months researching the simplest of these facts for Jonathan. For instance, the only suggestion of his birth date comes from an incredibly brief and cryptic newspaper obituary. It simply states that he was 57 years old when he died on January 12, 1821. So, despite an exhaustive search for proper documentation, I ultimately determined that unless he was born in the first 12 days of 1764 – which is entirely possible – I felt confident betting the odds on the previous 353 days in 1763. Don't even get me started on the 400 different ways to spell the name "Waitt"...

Many months later, the headstone arrived in Danvers in the midst of a bitterly cold January nor'easter. After waiting for the spring thaw (this was in Massachusetts, after all), I made arrangements, with the help of Peter Mirandi, Danvers' Director of Veterans Affairs, for the headstone to be picked up and installed by Jeff Moore of Kimball Memorials, who was willing to donate his services to honor this Revolutionary War Patriot.



This is where Libby entered the picture. Although neither of us had organized anything quite like this before, Libby, being a DAR member, had easy access to its grave-dedication ceremony's outline. Although I made efforts to locate and contact an active local SAR chapter, I received no response to my queries. So, I



found the documentation I needed online, along with videos I found on YouTube of other similar SAR ceremonies. From these, I created a "hybrid" ceremony, combining them into a unique event that was both educational and engaging for the attendees.

Through our combined efforts, Libby and I were able to enlist the help of not just her own DAR chapter, but those of a Danvers-based reenactment group, a veteran's color guard, a Marine Corps league attachment, a historical interpreter, a local funeral home, a photographer, a florist, a member of "Bugles Across America" and many others, all of them donating their services. We even read a statement from the current pastor of the very

church where Jonathan and his wife were married in 1781. Libby and I made all of these arrangements over the phone and through emails, in between our growing talks about history, our families, our lives, joys, and disappointments, as well as all manner of other discussions, both silly and serious. Although we hadn't yet met in person, we both considered each other to be dear friends, well before the Big Day on July 29, 2017.

In the days leading up to the ceremony, I was able to put some of my own professional skills to use. As a "recovering" public relations practitioner (because one never *really* leaves it behind) and small business owner, I was able to write and distribute a press release among the Boston media. I encouraged them to cover the re-dedication of this Revolutionary War soldier's "lost" grave, complete with lots of camera-friendly "visuals" like period costumes, colorful flags, 21-gun salutes, a bugler playing "Taps," young children (my own) unveiling a new headstone, wreaths, music, speeches, and more. I promised them interviews with me, Libby, Richard, and any number of the many Waitt descendants who traveled from five states to participate in the proceedings. Virtually all of the invited media showed up, and the coverage we received was worth its weight in gold – a lead story done live by one station and a quality feature story reserved for the evening news anchor by another. Our event was covered not only by the Boston TV and radio stations, but also by newspapers, magazines, web sites, and social media platforms. After 100 years of being ignored and neglected, Jonathan deserved all of the attention he

got. Plus, it all served as a wonderful segue to a larger discussion about the importance of early American graveyard preservation, which Richard made it a point to address during the ceremony itself. Overall, the event was well received, and I finally got to meet Libby in person.

With the re-dedication ceremony behind us, Libby and I continued our weekly correspondence. We spent many additional hours on the phone discussing not just the impact and effects of our event on the community, but on ourselves as well. We had both gained an increased appreciation for our veterans, our nation's history, and each other. I'll always remember when Libby said to me that she'd "found a friend for life" in me. The feeling was indeed mutual.

After a year or so, our calls naturally became less frequent – perhaps monthly rather than weekly – but we still spoke on the phone often. She hadn't been feeling well just before an unusually long stretch between our chats; so much so, that I contacted Richard to find out if he'd heard from her. He hadn't, but he knew she'd been in the hospital recently. It wasn't until I spoke with one of her DAR colleagues that I was told the sad news that she was in the final stages of terminal cancer. Through her DAR friend, Libby and I were able to exchange one last correspondence of deep respect and friendship toward each other. Then, she was gone, and my heart was broken, as were those of many who'd



known her far longer than I. I still think about her every day. Perhaps, through my fifth great grandfather, Jonathan Waitt, we were destined to share an amazing, one-of-a-kind experience and a true friendship — both of which I'll always remember and cherish.

Having found Jonathan and lost Libby, I wanted to honor them both by finally joining the Sons of the American Revolution, something I'd toyed with for a number of years. Naturally, I chose Jonathan as my application ancestor, although I had other, easier options available to me. I now proudly wear my rosette and look forward to many years of service to the SAR. In doing so, I wish to "promote patriotism, preserve American history and teach American history to future generations," as suggested by our SAR motto. Besides, there are most certainly other "lost" soldiers out there just waiting to be found and recognized for their service to this great nation of ours.
