


PASSAR President Greetings


I encourage you to complete the email addresses of your membership on your data bases which will create excellent communications at no cost to the chapter.

Re-Dedication of A Plaque

PASSAR President with Ken Brier US Army retired, Battalion Commander in Desert Storm. The occasion was the rededication of a plaque originally placed by Merion Chapter DAR 22 Feb 1919. It disappeared for several decades and was found and returned to its proper location. The plaque commemorates the encampment of Georgia 4th Battalion Continentals Aug 1777 under command of General Lachlan McIntosh and Col John White who took part in Washington's campaign about Philadelphia prior to the Battle of Brandywine. The plaque was restored by the Lower Merion Historical Society and is located in the church yard of St John Episcopal Church Levering Mill Road Bala Cynwyd, PA. The new granite base was donated by West Laurel Hill Cemetery.



So, Who Is NED Hector?

As a self-described wanna be genealogist I have discovered much about my family's history and what contributions were made to this country. From Four Grandparents who came over on *The Mayflower* to Ancestor Patriots who fought for our independence to today's contributions to our society, I have realized the remarkable and diverse family genetic makeup for which I am proud to be a part of.

As a Compatriot of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) I have been sharing information about my direct ancestor patriots and that there appears to always be something missing or a shadow of suspect when sharing with my relatives who are of different ethnicity and the barriers I have encountered along the way to awareness.

Recently, I was introduced to Noah Lewis, a Black Actor and American Revolutionary Patriot Re-enactor of Ned Hector, a Black Patriot who was described as a "Teamster – Bombardier".

Mr. Lewis's method and purpose has been to bring awareness within school districts, Reenactment Campaigns and Social Events of the African Americans who fought, struggled with prejudices from the highest levels of government, finding of acceptance and in some cases, gave their last measure to secure a place for all people to be free. Mr. Lewis, a scholarly man, shares Ned's story with audience participation and Laughter. He

creates a place of memorable learning and life lessons of appreciation.

It is apparent that his passion has made a lasting impact on members who feel disenfranchised and without a proud and honorable past that most

European-Americans, like myself, have experienced and compels me to reach out to a society who finds a country splintered by politics and social issues.

So, who was Ned Hector?

Wiki-pedia states that, "**Edward "Ned" Hector** (born about 1744) was an African

American soldier who fought in the American Revolutionary War. Hector was one of three to five thousand people

of color that fought for the cause of American independence. He served as a teamster (a wagon driver) and a bombardier (part of an artillery crew) with the state militia called Proctor's Third Pennsylvania Artillery, which by the end of 1777 became the Fourth Continental Artillery. The known battles he participated in are the Battle of Brandywine (September 11, 1777) and Germantown (October 4, 1777). In the Battle of Brandywine he disregarded his orders to abandon everything and retreat. He is remembered for replying to the orders, "The enemy shall not have my team; I will save my horses and myself!"¹

NEHGS Welcomes & Invite Registrars/Compatriots

Assisting Compatriots working Application/Genealogy Trail – SAR Congress 2016

This message may be of interest to your State Registrar, Chapter Registrars, and other Compatriots who work with new applications and genealogy.

The New England Historic Genealogical Society (NEHGS) is opening its doors to Compatriots and their guests attending the 2016 NSSAR Annual Congress in Boston.

NEHGS is America's most respected name in family history. Established in 1845, NEHGS is the nation's leading comprehensive resource for family history research and the largest society of its kind in the world. Expert family history services are provided through a staff of experienced professional genealogists, important publications in genealogy, a data-rich website providing access to millions of records, and educational opportunities. Its eight-story library houses the largest collection of family research materials in the country. The NEHGS aims to help family historians as they seek to explore their past and understand their families' unique place in history.

On Monday, July 11, NEHGS will host a free reception for up to 100 attendees for a general welcome and orientation and small group tours of the library. Those who attend this event will be able to return to the library on

either Tuesday or Wednesday, during regular operating hours, at no charge.

Registration for this ticketed event will be available soon at www.massar.org. Reservations will be accepted until Friday, July 1, 2016, in order of receipt, up to 100 invitees. After that date, reservations will be accepted on a space-available basis.

Registrants will receive a welcome letter from NEHGS, which will allow them to request a free 15-minute consultation, one-on-one, with a NEHGS staff genealogist on Tuesday, July 12, or Wednesday, July 13. Reservations must be made directly with NEHGS, using a web link provided in the welcome letter, no later than Wednesday, July 6, 2016. Those desiring a consultation should bring all of their genealogical information pertaining to their search, with a definite idea of the additional information they seek.

NEHGS is three blocks from the Westin Copley Place Hotel (a 5-10 minute walk). A map with directions to the library will be in each welcome packet.

Ratification of the U.S. Constitution Celebrated September 17, 2015

"We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America".

Today we celebrate the 228th anniversary of the ratification of the Constitution of the United States.

On September 17, 1787, the final draft of the new Constitution was read to the 42 delegates still at the convention in Philadelphia. Of the 42 men present, 39 affixed their signatures to the document and notified the Confederation Congress that their work was finished. The Congress, in turn, submitted the document to the states for ratification, where more argument, debate, and compromise would take

place. The state of Delaware was the first to ratify the Constitution. On June 21, 1788, just nine months after the state ratification process had begun, New Hampshire became the ninth state to ratify the Constitution, and the Constitution went into effect.

In the two centuries since its ratification, many changes have been made to the Constitution.

However, the basic premises on which the Constitution was framed – the protection of

individual rights and liberties, limited government with separation of powers and checks and balances, the federal system, and judicial review – remain at the heart of the "living" document. The first 10 amendments (Bill of Rights") added in December 1791 and Amendments 11 through 27 were ratified between 1795 and 1992.
